## We're Learning About

**MODELED READING:** sequence of events in plays

In our classroom this week, we are learning to read and spell closed syllable words with the consonant digraph ch or sh. Here are the letters and patterns to practice this week:

Consonants	b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, z y at the beginning of a word	
Vowels	a, e, i, o, u y at the end of a word	
Consonant Digraphs	A consonant digraph has <u>1 sound</u> spelled with 2 consonants side by side.	
Closed Syllables	Closed syllable words have 1 vowel letter followed by 1 or more consonants, and the vowel sound is short.	

Here are some examples of closed syllable words with the consonant digraph ch or sh:

Initial Digraph ch-	Final Digraph -ch	Initial Digraph sh-	Final Digraph -sh

# 1.er grado: Enfoque fonético semanal Lección 12

Esta semana vamos a aprender en clase a leer y a escribir palabras de silabas cerradas con el digrafo de consonantes ch o sh. A continuación están las letras y los patrones que se deben practicar esta semana:

Consonantes	b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, z letra y al inicio de una palabra	
Vocales	a, e, i, o, u letra y al final de una palabra	
Dígrafos de consonantes	Un dígrafo de consonantes es <u>1 sonido</u> escrito con 2 consonantes juntas.	
Sílabas cerradas	Las palabras con silabas cerradas tienen 1 vocal seguida de 1 o más consonantes, y el sonido de la vocal es corto.
